#### **Industrial Action**

During the last half term, you will be aware that the school made the decision to partially close, due to industrial action. The reason for the industrial action is detailed below.

- Pay for experienced teachers has fallen by one fifth in real terms since 2010. And now Britain is facing the worst cost-of-living crisis in a generation.
- Energy bills are soaring, inflation is at 12.3 per cent (August 2022) a forty-year high. But the Government is suggesting experienced teachers' pay should only go up by five per cent this year. This is a seven per cent cut.
- Schools have been required to cover the pay rises without sufficient budget increases, resulting in real time cuts to budgets.
- Long hours and poor pay are the main reasons teachers are leaving the profession in their droves. The Government is presiding over one of the worst recruitment and retention crises ever seen in education.
- Children are losing out because there are not enough teachers. Even when there is a teacher in the classroom, increasingly they are not qualified in the subject they are teaching. Parents and grandparents hear their children and grandchildren talking about 'new' teachers in the middle of the school year; of lessons being 'covered' by supply teachers, of teachers leaving. Lack of qualified teachers harms the education that children and young people receive.





There is further strike action planned for 2 March, 15 March and 16 March. I will update you with further details on this if required, but as before please do assume there may need to be a partial closure of the school on these days. Please do know that I look to minimise students time out of the academy, especially those most vulnerable and those in their GCSE years.

#### **Rewards at Oak**

We continue to reward students for all the amazing things they do at Oak. As ever I loved watching students be rewarded for their hard work during the last week of term.

#### **Teacher Certificates**

At the end of each term all teachers are given the opportunity to nominate students who the recognise as loving by our core values during lessons. In the last week students will have come home with certificates recognising this. In total teachers handed out 1252 certificates for excellence (381), community (127), kindness (159), respect (193) and courage (324). I hope students shared their certificates with you.

Soon in the new term we will be releasing an Easter Revision programme. Students across England will follow similar programmes during their holiday periods and therefore if students wish to achieve the grades they are capable of, it is vital they take the additional opportunities given to them.

Finally, in the run up to exams it is vital that all lessons remain disruption free. With this in mind, please be reassured that where a student repeatedly disrupts lessons, they will be removed from the class for an extended if not indefinite period of time. This gives students who want to achieve every opportunity to do so.





#### **Uniform**

During last half term we worked with a number of parents to ensure our uniform is smart and in line with policy. Many thanks for working with us on the following.

- **Leggings** girls cannot wear leggings to school. Girls can wear black trouser or a black skirt only.
- **Jumpers** students are allowed to wear an oak branded jumper **under their blazer**. This cannot be plain black and cannot be worn instead of the blazer.
- **Trainers** A very small minority of students continue to arrive in trainers that do not meet my criteria. A reminder that I expect any trainer syle show to have.
  - o A plain balck, leather style upper.
  - A plain black flat bottomed sole.
- Nose studs Students cannot wear a visible nose stud. Please do not allow you child to have their nose pierced in term time or during any holidays other than the start of the summer. Where students currently have nose piercings I expect the following.
  - For piercings done in the last 6 weeks, students must cover the piecing with micropore tape supplied by yourself. We will not supply.



 For piercings done more than 6 ago, any metal stud must be either removed or replaced by a very small clear retainer as in the picture.

We have supported a number of parents where financial diffulties have been a concern. Do please be in contact if you need our support and where we are able to we will support.

#### A reminder of the following guidance to schools around uniform.

- Schools have the right to enforce students wear a school uniform.
- Schools can discipline students who do not comply with the rules on uniform.
- Schools are allowed to send students to enable them to put the right uniform
- Sending the student home should NOT be an exclusion or an unauthorised absence unless the student
  persistently breaches the uniform or deliberately takes advantage of the time given to fix their
  uniform.
- Suspension is justified for repeated uniform breaches.

On return after the half term students not in correct uniform will be placed in isolation while we work with you as parents to correct this. If you are aware of issues in advance of your child's return please ensure you have emailed their relevant year team.














**Attendance Reward Trip**
